Senior Culinary students Taylor Carroll and Mercedes Decker prepared this masterpiece in preparation for the Police Chiefs Luncheon.





#### **Culinary Hosts Annual Police Chiefs Luncheon**

On Thursday, January 12th, senior Culinary Arts students started a dessert for the Police Chief Luncheon. On January 13th, Taylor Carroll and Mercedes Decker put final touches on the dessert (cover page) and made it look absolutely delicious. Our Chiefs and Resource Officers in attendance from the region made sure to "finish" the desserts at the end of a phenomenal meal.

The dessert consisted of yellow cake stuffed with homemade pastry and Bavarian cream, topped with ice cream and homemade chocolate ganache. Everything, except for the ice cream, was homemade to perfection.

The cakes were baked with a homemade egg and oil recipe and cooled overnight so they would be easier to work with the following day. The pastry cream was made by tempering eggs with steamed milk and cream. Students then added sugar, vanilla extract, and cornstarch. Once completed, students put the recipe into a 2 inch full hotel pan and wrapped it in saran wrap. The ganache was made by melting chocolate chunks and heavy cream in saucepan, stirring occasionally.

The morning of the luncheon, Taylor and Mercedes popped the cakes out of their molds. They cut the cakes in half and filled each with the creams and prepared a hole in the top half to fill with ice cream. When all the cakes were cut and filled, they were plated and drizzled with caramel sauce. The students filled the holes with ice cream and topped each with delicious ganache and a maraschino cherry.

#### Senior Electrical Students install Electric Vehicle Chargers for Rochester Town Hall

The Senior Electrical class recently completed the installation of electric vehicle chargers for the Rochester Town Hall. While much is the same, our world has changed significantly since the opening of Old Colony Regional in 1975.



The department is also in the process of training students on the installation and design of Photovoltaic Systems (Solar Electric Systems) using our full scale on-site interactive (grid tied) system as a training tool. Students are being exposed to off grid or standalone systems which are used in applications where obtaining power from the serving utilities' grid may not be feasible. Our Junior class continues to learn about the installation requirements for residential electrical installations using our on-site model house, associated building specifications and blueprints.

During their shop/related classroom cycles, students are trained to perform a complete electrical service calculation to determine the required electrical service size. In addition, students are being introduced to lighting and motor control systems utilizing our custom lighting and motor control center consoles pictured below.



The Sophomore class is learning about the installation requirements and wiring methods for commercial wiring systems such as EMT (Electrical Metallic Tubing) and RMC (Rigid Metal Conduit). During their shop/related cycles students learn how to calculate and fabricate field bends using the appropriate construction tools and safety equipment.

Upcycle Group

ASK, one of the most powerful words in the English language. The best educators create curiosity in their students. We pray that they'll "ask". Marsha Metivier asked if it would be okay to volunteer her time and start an Upcycle Group. What is that? We are glad you asked.

Wondering what to do with your old plastic bags? Ask Marsha Metivier. Carpentry students constructed two looms for the Upcycle Group to use in their efforts to make mats out of recycled plastic bags for the homeless. The first mat is almost complete (see photo to the left).

You see we're more than just a high school. We're teaching in a school without walls on a regular basis in an effort to teach our students the importance of paying it forward. This is just another example of how OCcreates<sup>™</sup> in an effort to better the world "beyond us".

## COSMETOLOGY

**Grade 10:** Once a month students visit the Acushnet and Rochester Senior Centers to perform free manicures on the people of the community. This is a service that Old Colony has provided to our area towns for close to 10 years. Mrs. Charbonneau, who retired in June of 2015, started this program.

**Grade 11:** Juniors are learning new techniques this year. They are now on the "Locks Salon" side of the department. Previously they had only worked on mannequins or their peers. Students are now booking appointments, greeting clients and performing cuts, colors, keratins, highlights, nails, facial waxing, facials and makeup on their clients. They are also performing special effect services such as Ombre and Balayage color. Students are trained in Acrylic nails, manicures, pedicures and gel nails. Our clientele is made up of staff, students and the public. Students are provided the full experience of working in a salon.

**Grade 12:** Our senior stylists continue to staff our "Locks Salon". Their concentration is on their speed and perfection of the task at hand. Students are preparing for their Massachusetts State Board Exam in order to become licensed Cosmetologists.

#### **Beyond Our Walls:**

**October 17<sup>th</sup>** - Grades 10, 11, and 12 attended the "Next Level Hair show" in Providence, Rhode Island. While there, students observed platform artists demonstrating the latest techniques in haircuts, color, hairstyles, and makeup.

**October** - Students articipated in "Trunk or Treat". Students "brainstormed" a theme and then decorated 2 cars, wore costumes for that theme and purchased all the candy to be given. This was a Friday night shop activity


**November 30<sup>th</sup>** - Senior students participated in "Cleaning Up" the Rochester Police Department. During the month of November, the Rochester police held a "No Shave November". Officers grew out their facial hair for a \$100 donation and then came to Old Colony's Locks Salon, to have their faces shaved. Our students donated part of the tip money collected that week to the cause. All money was donated to Home Base, a Red Sox Foundation and Massachusetts General Hospital that helps the military and their families with combat-related issues.

**Clean Wave** - Our grade 11 & 12 students are collecting clippings of the hair that they cut from our clients and storing it in a box. At the end of the school year we will be sending the box to *Matter of Trust Organization* which has a program called *Clean Wave*. They are an organization out of California that makes "hair booms and hair mats" used to soak up oil spills in harbors and motor oil spills in storm drains.

#### OCcreates™ for Carver Fire Department and Apponequet High School

The Carver Fire Department welcomed Old Colony Carpentry students to the brand new Fire Department Headquarters recently. After the students assembled a newly constructed conference table for the department, Chief Weston and Fire Fighter Wilcox (OC Graduate) gave our students a tour of the fire station and training facility. Chief Weston even trained our students how to use the fire pole (with a smile on his face supervising instructor Doug Sims opted out). A significant number of students in the Senior and Junior class worked on the table, but the following students really played a big roll in the construction of the piece that will represent the work of Old Colony Carpentry students at the Carver Fire Station for years to come:

The Carpentry Department would also like to thank Erin Murray from Graphics for providing the junior class a lesson on applying vinyl decals for the finishing touches associated with the table. The Carver Fire Department provided students with their own Carver Fire Department t-shirts as a thank you for their efforts and contribution.







**Seniors in the Carpentry program traveled to Apponequet High School in Lakeville** to give a trophy display case a "face lift". Students from the Class of 2017 and 2018 both worked on the 1st phase of this project. In the shop the students constructed and finished three mahogany shelves, new mahogany moldings and cut and finished a new plywood back. When we arrived on site the students removed the face frame and sliding glass front carefully so it could be reinstalled. They removed the existing shelving and moldings. The students then installed the new plywood back and mitered and installed the new moldings. After that a few students cut the new shelves down to size while others applied the final coat of polyurethane. The students then drilled new holes to make the shelves adjustable and reinstalled the sliding glass and face frame. Phase 2 will consist of constructing and installing 4 new oak display cases in the hallway next to the Apponequet gymnasium.

## **Project-based Learning for Real World Problem Solving**

Preparing our students for the real world through real work

Old Colony Computer Science (CS) students are deep into a number of outreach projects. The seniors are finishing up a new website for the Onset Fire Department, while junior students are building an online ordering system for the Cougar's Den. As part of our junior/senior curriculum, Computer Science students design and develop software that will solve a problem within our school community.

Currently students are working on projects to create online banking (Kyle Corga and Sadie Lombardi, juniors) and payroll systems (Conor Babcock and Troy Hermenau, seniors) to help the CIS, Cosmetology, and CAD Drafting departments. Another student (Zack Fay, senior) is creating a digital sign-out book to be used in Old Colony classrooms. Our entire sophomore class is collecting data to answer research questions regarding teen social issues related to bullying, social media, and video games.

At the beginning of January, three alumni visited our shop to meet with students. Two of the students are majoring in Computer Science at UMASS Dartmouth and have worked at Slocum Design Studio (Dartmouth, MA). The other student is a Computer Science student at Worcester Polytech and was the first freshman intern to be hired as a software developer by the health service company Optum (Boston, MA).

These students are further examples of the many options available for our Old Colony students when they graduate from high school.
